Additional Information about Children's Mental Health supports in Tompkins County:

Children's Health Home Care Management: The Health Home Care Management program provides services to youth who are enrolled in Medicaid when they are being challenged by serious emotional difficulties. HHCM services include an assessment of a person's strengths and needs, coordination and development of a care plan, a safety plan, connections to community resources, monitoring the overall services being delivered, and obtaining any services necessary for meeting basic human needs, including physical health. This program uses an individual approach in that there is one person working with your family. The care manager works to ensure that families have everything necessary to stay healthy, out of the emergency room and out of the hospital. Participation in this program is always voluntary and there are no fees involved. There are currently 6 care management agencies serving youth in Tompkins County: Elmira Psychiatric Center, Racker, Pathways, William George Agency, Elmcrest, Hillside and Children's Home of Wyoming Conference. Families may choose the agency they prefer. Children/youth qualify for CHHCM if they have a mental health diagnosis that is documented by a licensed mental health or medical practitioner. The attached SED verification form should be completed along with the C-SPOA Part 1 referral form.

Non-Medicaid Care Management: This support is for children and youth and who do not meet the guidelines to receive Medicaid health insurance. They receive the same support described above under Children's Health Home Care Management. If youth are placed on a waitlist for this support, the SPOA Coordinator will review alternative options for support with the family. There are two agencies in Tompkins County who serve youth without Medicaid – Elmira Psychiatric Center and Racker. Children/youth qualify for non-Medicaid Care management if they have a mental health diagnosis that is documented by a licensed mental health or medical practitioner. The attached SED verification form should be completed along with the C-SPOA Part 1 referral form.

Community Residences

Community Residences provide a supervised, therapeutic environment for six to eight children or adolescents, between the ages of 5 and 18 years, that includes structured daily living activities, problem solving skills development, a behavior management system and caring consistent adult interactions. Most often, needed clinical supports for the child and family are provided by community-based services.

Tompkins County youth typically reside in community residences in Elmira, Bath, or Canandaigua.

Residential Treatment Facilities

Residential treatment facilities (RTF) provide fully integrated mental health treatment services to seriously emotionally disturbed (SED) youth between the ages of 5 and 18. The RTF admission is voluntary on the part of the youth and family and cannot be court ordered. The facility is within the continuum of services provided and regulated by the Office of Mental Health. Residential treatment facilities are less restrictive, unlocked and less intensely staffed than psychiatric centers and are operated by non-profit agencies.

Tompkins County is located in the Office of Mental Health Western Region. Youth receive treatment in facilities located in Rochester or Buffalo area.

Mental Health/Counseling

Tompkins County Mental Health Clinic

The *Children and Youth Program* is a NYS licensed outpatient treatment program for children with mental health problems. Services include psychiatric evaluation / assessment, psychological evaluation, social / family / home evaluation, behavior evaluation, medical assessments and alcohol and substance abuse screening. Also provided are services to Tompkins County Family Court in the form of mandated evaluations and treatment of children and their families referred by the Court.

Family & Children's Service of Ithaca

Our *clinical program* offers high-quality, confidential, and affordable counseling services in a welcoming and caring atmosphere for children, preschool age through adolescence, and their families.

Family and Children's Service of Ithaca offers *psychiatric services* to clients receiving therapy in our clinical program. Psychiatry referrals are made when the therapist believes that receiving this service at Family & Children's Service could be a beneficial addition to the client's mental health treatment.

Dispositional Alternatives Program (DAP) & Rural Outreach Program (ROP) provide case management, mentoring and skill-building in recreational groups for youth ages 8 to 17 struggling with mental or behavioral issues.

Kinect – Kinship Caregiver Education, Counseling and Training KINECT provides support and services for kinship caregivers in Tompkins County. Kinship caregivers are family members, or close family friends, who have stepped up to become foster parents to children in need. Currently, relatives who take care of foster children are provided very little support by DSS. Services include education to caregivers, home-based clinical case-management, direct counseling to caregivers, and advocacy and support in Family Court, with DSS, in schools, etc.

Crisis admissions require adolescents to manage themselves safely in an outpatient setting, without evidence of suicidal intent or plan. Adolescents who are not at risk of imminent danger to themselves or others are eligible.

Adolescents using the 3-5-day respite stay are required to be in ongoing counselling, with a primary mental illness diagnosis. Crisis admission referrals can come from CPEP, licensed providers (including school social workers or psychologists) or through the ACR coordinator if on duty. Respite referrals can come from primary therapists or other service providers. If being submitted by community service provider or school, referral must have sign off by adolescent's primary therapist for counselling and diagnosis verification.
